THE LIBRARY OF FRANCESCO
AND ERMOLAO BARBARO

Nearly thirty years ago an inventory of the library of Giovanni Pico della Mirandola was published from a Vatican manuscript by Professor Pearl Kibre.¹ The latter part of this inventory presented a problem, for which we think we have the solution. At item 1132 Miss Kibre remarks, «The inventory proper may be said to end at this point.» There follow some summaries and (1133-1147) a brief register of loans from the preceding list. Then comes the problem: a list of 550 items (1148-1697) under various headings (*a stampa, a penna, etc.*²), the relation of which to the preceding is neither indicated nor evident at all. Miss Kibre calls this part the classified lists and says of it (p. 7), «Many of these books do not appear to have belonged to Pico's library and probably represent later additions made by the sixteenth-century copyist. We have therefore disregarded them in our survey of Pico's collection.» Miss Kibre did well to disregard them but include them in the publication and, moreover, in the index.

I became interested in this list of books when I observed some uncommon Greek works in it, such as did not exist in translation or in print until rather late. On closer inspection it appeared that items 1545-1697 were probably almost all Greek manuscripts (except 1555, 1617, 1696). A collection of 150 Greek manuscripts would always be noteworthy, and I began to hope this one might be recognized by identifying some single items in it and then ascertaining their history. This track soon led to the conclusion that the whole list 1148-1697 is an inventory of the library of the Venetian Ermolao Barbaro, including that of his grandfather Francesco Barbaro. Several identifications of items with existing codices that belonged to Francesco or Ermolao seem absolutely certain,³ and most of the codices known to have belonged to them can be found in the list. This conclusion becomes somewhat more circumstantial in view of the fact that the Vatican manuscript of the list came from Johannes Questenberg, who was an admirer if not an acquaintance of Ermolao Barbaro.⁴

Francesco Barbaro (d. 1454) was a versatile man, whose career exhibits political and even military talents along with an active interest in intellectual life. One of the few Venetians to participate in the early Renaissance, he learned Greek from Guarino Veronese and visited Florence in 1415 to make the acquaintance of Traversari, Niccoli, and others, with whom he maintained a life-long correspondance. His youthful work *De re uxoria* is a famous and typical example of the new ideas that were sweeping over Italy.¹ Such activities of course required books, and his correspondance often shows him seeking, borrowing, lending, or copying the ancient Greek and Latin works that were so rapidly coming to light in his time. Quite a few books with his inscription of purchase or ownership have survived, designated below as *Francisci Barbari*. Their presence in our list seems to show that they were inherited by his grandson.

Ermolao (Almordò) Barbaro (1453-1493) was rather more of a scholar and less a man of affairs than his grandfather. He opened a school of his own in Venice in 1484, distinguished for its new approach to Aristotle. He went to Rome as Venetian ambassador in 1490 and died there prematurely a few months after the publication of his chief work *Castigationes Plinianae*. He was mentioned with Angelo Poliziano and Giovanni Pico della Mirandola as a leading light of his age, although his work, for all its erudition, scarcely equals theirs in permanent importance.²

In 1491 Janus Lascaris visited Padua and Venice on his way to Greece to procure books for Lorenzo de' Medici. Among his memoranda of this journey is a list of Greek works entitled παρ' Ἐρμόλεω.³ There is a little difficulty about the date, as Ermolao was not in Venice in 1491. Lascaris gives about sixty titles, in Latin instead of his usual Greek. Since he was only selecting works of interest to himself or his mission, his list is not a full catalogue of Ermolao's holdings. Moreover, many of his titles were interior items in the codices and so would not appear in an inventory. Nevertheless there is such agreement between Lascaris and our list as to constitute positive proof that both refer to the same collection of codices. I shall cite Lascaris' titles below in course.

Letters *B. M.* that appear before many items in our list (1175, etc.) are still a mystery (see Mercati, 75, 2 n. 5).

The subsequent fate of Ermolao's library is unknown.¹ Probably at least part of it was in Rome when he died there in 1493. The later possession of several codices by the Farnese (nn. 1590-1597 *infra*) and by Fulvio Orsini (1557, 1571, 1588, 1619, 1663) suggests dispersion in Rome. The main part of the library must have remained in Venice. Two codices (1635, 1663) are inscribed *Francisci Barbari* and *Alvixi Barbari*, who I suppose were the ones who edited Ermolao's work on Dioscorides in Venice in 1516.² Many codices of Francesco (senior) and Ermolao were in Venice in the 18th century, in the possession of Apostolo Zeno (1562, 1584, 1649) and J. B. Recanati (1212, 1298, 1599, 1612, 1632) and in the monastery of San Michele di Murano.³ The identifications below reveal two early subsequent possessors who were students in Venice and Padua: J. B. Posthumus de Leone (1672, cf. 1634, 1666)⁴ and Germain Brice of Auxerre (1545, 1622, 1624).⁵ Both possessed a number of Greek codices, among which may be others of Barbaro unrecognized. In fact all the Greek codices of Germain Brice can be found in our list,⁶ and I have assumed tentatively that they all came from the Barbaro library. Germain Brice came to Venice in the suite of Janus Lascaris ambassador of France in 1507.

Following are identifications of items in the list with codices of Francesco or Ermolao Barbaro or with anonymous codices that can be recognized by their contents or their later or earlier owners. Since my searches have been more thorough among Greek codices, there probably are at least some Latin codices of the Barbaro I have overlooked. Professor Billanovich has kindly supplied several Latin codices of Francesco Barbaro.
